For healthy pollination population to survive, it requires food, moisture and shelter:

Food is the nectar or pollen of the plant.

Water can be found as rainwater, damp stones or gravel after watering, damp leaves from dew, bird baths and fountains along with natural streams and ponds.

Shelter from storms and predators comes from nearby shrubs and bushy perennials.
