

GREENS SALE



Holiday Plant Care

Proper care helps poinsettias maintain their appearance and increases their longevity.



Room temperatures between 65-75°. Keep away from heat vents or doors.

Place plants in an area with bright, natural light, but avoid direct sunlight.

For best color display under artificial light, use cool white fluorescent bulbs.

Check the soil moisture daily and water plants only when potting media feels dry.
